

## Idea 5 – Priorities Poster

We are keen to learn how residents think research could make the biggest difference to their lives.

To get things started, we've made a poster with some suggestions of things researchers could focus on. Residents can say or point to which areas are most important for researchers to address. Stickers, stamps (e.g., a bingo stamp) or putting a cross could be used to indicate their "vote".

After the activity is finished, a picture can then be sent back to us (please email [carehomepriorities@herts.ac.uk](mailto:carehomepriorities@herts.ac.uk) if prepaid postage is needed), or you could take a photograph and email it to us; just make sure that it is clear, that no personal information is on the poster and that no one is visible in the picture.

Want to give more detail about why a resident has voted for a particular topic? Consider printing some of our answer cards before the session too so that you can write about their answers in more detail.






To print the poster, choose to print **pages 2-3 single-sided**. Stick it up as shown in the below picture, with the instructions above the grid.

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
